

The Executive committee has taken steps in revamping the HKBA website, incorporating features which will help improve the quality of deliverables in terms of communication and ease of administration. These are considered to yield long term benefits bringing value to the Members and thereby the Organisation.



বন্ধবর সোমদেব অনুরোধ করলেন দুর্গা পূজা স্মরণিকার জন্য একটা লেখা দিতে। একে বন্ধ মানুষ তায় আবার বঙ্গসমাজের সভাপতি, পালাবার সব রাস্তাই বন্ধ। অগত্যা জয় মা দগগা বলে কাগজ কলম নিয়ে বসলাম। কিন্তু বসেই আতান্তর। কী লিখি! না আছে কলমের জোর আর না পারি কল্পনার ডানায় ভর করে উড়ে যেতে। অগতির গতি খবর কাগজের শরণাপন্ন হলাম। অনেকদিন পরে সম্প্রতি আবার বাংলা কাগজ পড়তে শুরু করেছি। মাঝে মাঝে দু-একটা নতুন শব্দ দেখতে পাই. যেগুলো আমাদের ছেলেবেলায় আমরা দেখতে পেতাম না। স্বাভাবিক। গত পঁচিশ তিরিশ বছর আমি দেশছাডা। ইতিমধ্যে দেশের সমাজ বদলেছে, আর তার সাথে তাল মিলিয়ে ভাষাও বদলেছে। ভাবলাম সেই সব নতুন নতুন শব্দগুলোর ওপরে কিছু লিখি। আমার মতো আরও যাঁরা বহুদিন দেশছাড়া তাঁরা হয়তো এতে কিছটা আনন্দ পাবেন। তবে শুরুতেই বলে রাখি, ভাষার ওপরে কিছু লিখতে গিয়ে আমি আমার নিজের দক্ষতার গণ্ডী ছাড়িয়ে যাচ্ছি। আশা করি সুধী পাঠক নিজগুণে আমার এই ধৃষ্টতা মার্জনা করবেন।

শুরু করি **পাতান্তর** কথাটি দিয়ে। শব্দটি যখন প্রথমে নজরে আসে, তখন ভেবেছিলাম অতি + অন্তর –এর কোনও রকম অপভ্রংশে কথাটির সৃষ্টি, বোধ হয় এর অর্থ অনেক পার্থক্য বা ওই ধরনের কিছু। কিন্তু সংসদের অভিধান খুলে দেখলাম আমার আন্দাজ একদম ভুল। কথাটির সঠিক মানে সঙ্কট বা দুরবস্থা। সংস্কৃত মূল শব্দটি অবস্থান্তর, অপভ্রংশে অথান্তর এবং চলতি বাংলায় সেটা হয়ে দাঁডাল আতান্তর। কলকাতায় এবার বৃষ্টি বেশ ভাল হয়েছে। সেই প্রসঙ্গে খবর কাগজে একটি খবর বেরোলো। মরসুমের প্রথম ভারী বৃষ্টি। ফের ভাসল শহর। ফের ভুগলেন শহরবাসী। আর শহরে জল জমার দায় কার, তা নিয়ে দিনভর চাপানউতার চলল পুরসভা ও সিইএসসি-র। চাপান কথাটির একটি অর্থ কবিগান, তরজা প্রভৃতিতে এক পক্ষ অন্য পক্ষকে সমাধানের জন্য প্রশ্ন করা। আর উতর কথাটি উত্তরের প্রাদেশিক রূপ। কাজেই সহজ করে বলতে গেলে চাপান-উতার কথাটির মানে দাঁড়ায় সওয়াল-জবাব, সাধু ভাষায় বলা যায় প্রশ্নোত্তর। তবে চাপানউতোর কিংবা সওয়াল-জবাব কথাগুলির মধ্যে যে কাব্যিক কিংবা সাবলীল ভাবটি আছে, প্রশ্নোত্তর কথাটি সেই তুলনায় অনেকখানি নিরস মনে হয়।

বৈদ্যুতিন কথাটি প্রথম যখন নজরে আসে, তখন ভেবেছিলাম বৈদ্যুতিক কথাটি ছাপার ভুলে বৈদ্যুতিন হয়ে গিয়েছে। আমার ১৯৮৪ সালের সংসদের অভিধানে কথাটি নেই। ইন্টারনেট খুঁজে জানতে পারলাম এটি electronics-এর বাংলা রূপান্তর।

খবর কাগজ পড়ে আর একটি নতুন কথা সম্প্রতি শিখলাম – সুরতহাল। অভিধান খুঁজে জানতে পারলাম এই কথাটির অর্থ - সশরীরে তদন্ত, 'ময়নাতদন্ত, ঘটনার প্রকৃত অবস্থা। কথাটির উৎপত্তি সুরত থেকে। সুরত মানে চেহারা, আকৃতি বা সৌন্দর্য। যেমন ধরুন নাসিরুদ্দিনের দেহের সুরতহাল করার পর ম্যাজিস্ট্রেটও স্বীকার করে নেন, দেহে প্রচুর আঘাতের চিহ্ন রয়েছে।

আজকাল *আধিকারিক* কথাটি খুবই ব্যবহার করা হয়। আমি ভাবতাম আধিকারিক মানে বাংলা-ইংরেজি অভিধানে আধিকারিক বলতে আমলা অর্থাৎ অফিসার বোঝাচ্ছে।

কালী পূজোর এখন ঢের দেরী। শব্দদূষণ নিয়ন্ত্রণের জন্য শব্দবাজি নিয়ে কিছু সরকারি নিয়ম জারি করা হয়েছে। ভাবলাম শব্দদূষণ (sound pollution) বোঝাতে এই শব্দটার উদ্ভাবন হয়েছে। সম্প্রতি সরকার সেই নিয়মাবলীর কিছুর পরিবর্তন করায় ধোঁয়াশা সৃষ্টি হয়েছে। তার ফলে ধন্দে পড়েছে পুলিশ। তাই ভাবলাম রকবাজি, বোমাবাজি, তোলাবাজির মতো শব্দবাজিও পাড়ার দাদাদের কিছু অবদান। কথাটি সংসদের অভিধানে খুঁজে পেলাম না। মনে হচ্ছে কথাটির আসল অর্থ খুব জোরে আওয়াজ করে ফাটে সেই রকম পটকা।

কিন্তু সেই ধোঁয়াশা নিয়ে সরকারি আধিকারিকদের কোনও *হেলদোল* নেই। এই কথাটিও আমার সংসদের অভিধানে পেলাম না। লেখার প্রসঙ্গ থেকে মনে হয় হেলদোল নেই মানে নির্বিকার (unconcerned)।

আমরা সবাই IT-র কথা জানি। এর সমার্থক বাংলা শব্দটি হল তথ্য প্রযুক্তি। কিন্তু science and technology বা engineering & technology – র বাংলাটা কি হবে তা ঠিক মনে আসছে না।

সকালে অফিস যাওয়ার সময় এবং সন্ধ্যে বেলা বাড়ি ফেরার সময় ট্রাফিক জ্যামে আটকে পড়া কলকাতাবাসীদের জীবন দৈনন্দিন ব্যাপার। যানজট কথাটি এর এক সুন্দর বাংলা অনুবাদ। কিন্তু কেন এই যানজট? বলা হয়ে থাকে মাথা পিছু রাস্তার পরিকাঠামো (infrastructure) যথেষ্ট না থাকার ফলেই এই দুর্দশা।

যে বাংলা শব্দটা নিয়ে আমি সবথেকে বেশী ঝামেলার মধ্যে পড়েছিলাম সেটি হল বস্তুনিষ্ঠতা। ইন্টারনেটে দেখলাম কথাটি বাংলাদেশে বহুল প্রচলিত, বিশেষত ব্লগারদের মধ্যে। বাংলাদেশের একটি খবর কাগজের লোগো-তে দেখলাম লেখা আছে বস্তুনিষ্ঠতায় প্রতিশ্রুতিবদ্ধ। কিন্তু পশ্চিম বাংলায় এর চল অপেক্ষাকৃত কম। সংসদ কিংবা আশুতোষ দেবের অভিধানে কথাটির উল্লেখ নেই। অনেক খুঁজে শেষ পর্যন্ত সাহিত্য একাদেমির পরিভাষা সঙ্কলন বলে একটা চটি বইয়ে পেলাম এই কথাটি অর্থ – objectivity।

কিছুদিন আগে বাংলাদেশ সরকার জামায়েত-ই-ইসলামির রাজনৈতিক *নিবন্ধন* বাতিল করেছেন। আমি জানতাম নিবন্ধ কথাটি প্রবন্ধের সমার্থক (essay)। অভিধান খুলে দেখলাম নিবন্ধের আর এক মানে হল তালিকা। নিবন্ধ থেকে তৈরি হল নিবন্ধন, মানে তালিকাভুক্ত করণ – অর্থাৎ registration।

ফিরে আসি এপার বাংলায়। আপনারা হয়তো জানেন যে অন্ধ্রপ্রদেশ ভাগ হয়ে তেলেঙ্গানাকে একটি নতুন রাজ্য হিসেবে তৈরি করা হচ্ছে। সেই প্রসঙ্গে খবর কাগজে রায়ালসীয়া বলে একটি কথা বার বার উল্লেখ করা হচ্ছিল। ভেবেছিলাম এটা বোধহয় সীমানা সম্পর্কিত কোনও বাংলা কথা। কিন্তু পরে দেখলাম এটি অন্ধ্রপ্রদেশের একটি বিশেষ অঞ্চলের নাম। বিজয়নগরের রায়াল রাজবংশ এই অঞ্চলে রাজত্ব করতেন, সেই সুবাদে বিংশ শতান্দীর শুরুর দিকে অন্ধ্রপ্রদেশ সরকার ওই অঞ্চলটির নাম দেন রায়ালসীমা।

# **BIZNESS AND BANGALEES**

The building from where Bengal is governed "Writers building" was built in 1776 by then lieutenant governor Ashley Eden to keep the English writers or more commonly English clerks there. We quote very easily from Mahatma Gandhi "It is possible to do business honestly but with extremely difficulties" & we feel proud to profess ourselves as 'Honest' whether we are or not, as we are clerk and not bizness-man. But history says otherwise - 'Chand Saudagor', Dhonopoti Saudagor, Jagat Seth to recent Dwarkanath Thakur all were successful businessman. A trait remained among Bengalis which I am sure if rightly re-directed would eventually enmesh enough amount of wealth to get the Bengal out of debt trap. Subtleties of the modern business economics are well known to Bengali mass in some form or the other. My belief was recently reinforced during my journey to the city of joy. Let me take you to that journey.

Howrah! Howrah! Bhetore Khali Ache - While waiting at Dharmotolla one sultry afternoon noticed that the bus conductors from the crowded public buses

"I am ok but there was a mummy in here" she said. "I just woke up and there was a mummy right here and I screamed"


Just then Dr Annorax stuck his head through the door followed by Consiel, Nedland and the camera crew (recording): Jurgen, Adi and James.

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# A Trip To Thailand






In the evening we went out for dinner and came back to sleep.

# **An Unique Experience Dialogue in the dark**

Dialogue in the dark is an amazing adventure of unknown. Feel how it is to see the surroundings using our senses like smell, touch & feel without vision? Set in several rooms of pitch black darkness assisted by guides who are visually handicapped from illness to being born like that or even an accident.

### The experience

As we enter it feels claustrophobic but then we get adjusted to it slowly. At the entrance they provide us with a walking stick which is our only support in the dark all throughout the journey of 1 hour and 15 minutes. We were given basic instructions and taken in. At first we felt textures with our feet hence walked on various surfaces like grass, rock, tiled floors etc. Next followed adjustments to movements and situation by crossing a bridge that shook a lot which gave me goose bumps imagining me alone without a help stuck amidst typhoon. Next was to get a sense of direction by following sound, we were advised to cross a road through a pedestrian crossing with the familiar buzzer sound at any pedestrian crossing in Hong Kong. This is the first time I realized the importance of the sound signal in a pedestrian crossing. I felt so pleased thinking of the facilities the Government of Hongkong has developed for the visually handicapped. As we were crossing the road the signal turned Red and we were not sure how far the other side was, a frightening experience!

We were lead to a theatre. Here we were trained to use our ears or hearing senses to enjoy dramas, music concert, etc. without seeing the performance. Time for break hence we enter a café where we have to find a seat, here we were trained on the touch and feel. The familiar HONGKONG DOLLAR coins for the first time made me realize why their shapes were different from each other and imagined the thoughtfulness in designing them. In the café the snacks and drinks were announced by the counter attendant hence selecting was easy but managing it by keeping and taking it from table was difficult.

Hong Kong as a country is kind to people who have disabilities. In dialogue in the dark I had the opportunity to experience life without sight.
